

Writing Guide: Sentence Fragments

A sentence fragment is a grammatical error in which a word group that is not

a sentence is punctuated as if it were.

To be a sentence, a word group must

have a subject, have a verb, and express a complete thought.

Here are some sentence fragments:

Under the table. (No subject or verb) Talked loudly with her friends. (No subject) Walking along the sun-splashed Florida beach. (No verb) Because my brother believes in ghosts. (Does not express a complete thought)

Here are two ways to fix a sentence fragment:

- 1. Make the fragment a complete sentence by adding a subject or verb or rewriting it in some other way.
- 2. Attach the fragment to a nearby sentence (usually the preceding sentence).

Here are the four fragments above fixed:

The history book is lying under the table.

(Subject and verb added to make a complete sentence)

Professor Romanov talked loudly with her friends. (Subject added to make a complete sentence)

Walking along the sun-splashed Florida beach *delighted* Ida's grandmother.

(Verb added to make a complete sentence)

We keep the house lights on at night because my brother believes in ghosts.

(Fragment attached to a nearby sentence)
