The report determined that the course was meeting the needs of the students based on the average test scores being higher than the 70% benchmark.

The action plan focuses on the availability of Blackboard data from different instructors each semester. The availability of this data continues to be a challenge because course owners are not automatically added to each section's Blackboard sites. Course data was available from many sections over the course of four years. Centralized collection of data is a departmental issue that is being addressed.

Course data was available from only some sections over the course of four years. Centralized collection of data is a departmental issue that is being addressed. Data from each section is not available, but enough data is present from an adequate cross section of the student population to support the assessment. 140 students were in the collected data overall, but some students did not participate in the activity. There were three students who did not complete this activity.

Available data that was used to assess is from Winter of 2021 through Winter of 2024. These sections are both day and evening classes. All classes are face-to-face or mixed mode with both lecture and lab content.

We administered an embedded departmental exam. The departmental exam had 20 questions and the exam was scored using an answer key. The ASE Education

Foundation (Formerly the National Automotive Technicians Education Foundation, or NATEF) requires a course embedded safety exam, and students are required to pass this exam before they are allowed to work in the lab environment.

6. Briefly describe assessment results based on data collected for this outcome and tool during the course assessment. Discuss the extent to which students achieved this learning outcome and indicate whether the standard of success was met for this outcome and tool.

Met Standard of Success: Yes

Department exam: 100% of students passed with a score of 70% or above 137/137 students).

7. Based on your interpretation of the assessment results, describe the areas of strength in student achievement of this learning outcome.

This exam is administered at the beginning of the semester. The participation rate and success rate are high for two reasons. The students are engaged at the beginning of the semester, and completion of this exam is required for the students to work in the lab environment.

The student performance could be improved by getting all registered students to complete this activity. A few students will fail to complete this activity, and subsequently will fail to complete any future activities. As a department, we have laptops available for the students to borrow so they can complete this exam and still participate in their lab activities the same day.

Course data was available from only some sections over the course of four years. Centralized collection of data is a departmental issue that is being addressed. Data from each section is not available, but enough data is present from an adequate cross section of the student population to support the assessment. 140 students were in the collected data overall, but some students did not participate in the activity. There were 13 students who did not complete this activity.

Available data that was used to assess is from Winter of 2021 through Winter of 2024. These sections are both day and evening classes. All classes are face-to-face or mixed mode with both lecture and lab content.

We administered an embedded departmental exam. The departmental exam had 10 questions and the exam was scored using an answer key.

6. Briefly describe assessment results based on data collected for this outcome and tool during the course assessment. Discuss the extent to which students achieved this learning outcome and indicate whether the standard of success was met for this outcome and tool.

Met Standard of Success: Yes

Department exam: 96.9% of students passed with a score of 70% or above (123/127 students).

7. Based on your interpretation of the assessment results, describe the areas of strength in student achievement of this learning outcome.

This exam is administered early in the semester. It has a high participation rate because the students are engaged, and they are motivated to use shop tools in our lab.

8. Based on your analysis of student performance, discuss the areas in which student achievement of this learning outcome could be improved. If student met standard of success, you may wish to identify your plans for continuous improvement.

Because the completion of this exam is not required to continue to work in our lab environment, some students will opt to skip the exam but still attempt to participate in the lab activities. The department plans to implement more outcomes that are required for the student to continue working in our lab. This may increase participation in exams such as the one aligned with this outcome. This can also potentially increase safety in our labs. It is a balance between course retention, lab participation on a particular day, and the participation in an activity aligned with a learning outcome.

Course data was available from only some sections over the course of four years. Centralized collection of data is a departmental issue that is being addressed. Data from each section is not available, but enough data is present from an adequate cross section of the student population to support the assessment. 140 students were in the collected data overall, but some students did not participate in the activity. There were 27 students who did not complete this activity.

Available data that was used to assess is from Winter of 2021 through Winter of 2024. These sections are both day and evening classes. All classes are face-to-face or mixed mode with both lecture and lab content.

We administered an embedded labs skills sheet. The skills sheet had 10 criteria and the skills sheet was scored using a key.

6. Briefly describe assessment results based on data collected for this outcome and tool during the course assessment. Discuss the extent to which students achieved this learning outcome and indicate whether the standard of success was met for this outcome and tool.

Met Standard of Success: Yes

Lab skills sheet: 82.3% of students passed with a score of 70% or above (93/113 students).

7. Based on your interpretation of the assessment results, describe the areas of strength in student achievement of this learning outcome.

The lab skills sheet was administered in our lab environment. This represents a different view of a student's learning than an exam on a computer outside of lab

time at WCC. This outcome represents a student's ability to translate other lectures and online learning to a hands-on environment in real time.

8. Based on your analysis of student performance, discuss the areas in which student achievement of this learning outcome could be improved. If student met standard of success, you may wish to identify your plans for continuous improvement.

The lab skills sheet was administered later in the semester than the exams aligned with the first two outcomes. This was reflected by the lower student participation number. In addition, students performed at a lower success rate than the departmentally administered exams. More students miss class sessions as the semester continues due to attrition or challenges with establishing a work/school/life balance. Students can miss some class sessions and still earn a passing grade. The improvements in this outcome will align with general retention strategies during the semester.

We administered an embedded labs skills sheet. The skills sheet had 10 criteria and the skills sheet was scored using a key.

Met Standard of Success: Yes

Lab skills sheet: 89.3% of students passed with a score of 70% or above (92/103 students).

89.3% of the students could perform basic mechanical repairs based on the lab skills sheet. This outcome represents a student's ability to translate other lectures and online learning to a hands-on environment in real time.

The course is meeting the needs of the students based on their readiness to pass the departmental exam (which mimics the State of MI and ASE certification exams) with a success rate of 70% or higher. Those courses also have high success rates, which is an indicator that this course is helping prepare students for their upcoming courses.

The sections of this course used for assessment were both morning and evening courses. No DL or MM courses were offered.

Students had to read a chapter on safety or watched a safety video. They were required to take a safety quiz. The instructor teaching the coruse entered scores into Blackboar.

Met Standard of Success: Yes

For this outcome 95.08 percent of the students scored over 70%. When compared to the written outcome language, "70% of the students will score an overall average of 70% or higher" students met the standard of success. Formulas were used to determine the number of students with an outcome of over 70%, and then that number as compared to the sample size.

Students performed very well on this task. 95.08% of the students scored 100% on this task. Shop safety is extremely important and students are expected to score 100% on the quiz. Those students who did not score 100% did not complete the quiz.

Students are allowed to take quizzes more than once in order to earn the credit. This is something that the department will consider revising this practice in the future.

For this outcome 96.77 percent of the students scored over 70%. This is compared to the written outcome language, "70% of the students will score an overall average of 70% or higher." Students met the standard of success.

96.77% of the students score 100% on the tool identification worksheet. Students will use this important skill throughout the semester.

Met Standard of Success: Yes

For this outcome 90.16 percent of the students scored over 70%. This is compared to the written outcome language, "70% of the students will score an overall average of 70% or higher."

91.14% of the students scored 70% or higher, with the majority of the students earning 100% on the checklist. Two students scored 70% and three students didn't complete the task. This shows a good understanding of tire service skills.

Students performed an oil change. The task was scored using the NATEF checklist. Student's scores were recorded in Blackboard by the course instructor.

Met Standard of Success: Yes

For this outcome 96.67 percent of the students scored over 70%. This is compared to the written outcome language, "70% of the students will score an overall average of 70% or higher."

7. Based on your interpretation of the assessment results, describe the areas of strength in student achievement of this learning outcome.

All students in the sample earned some or all of the available credit for this outcome. Only a few (3 of 61) did not earn full credit but did achieve the 70% threshold listed in the outcome definition. This outcome is correlated to a special interest topic in the course that most students wanted to participate in. The curriculum is well aligned to the tasks addressed in this outcome, and has a high success rate because the students are engaged.

Success rates were very high. Students managed to earn high scores even when they performed poorly on other outcomes.

Students cut the exhaust off the shop vehicle and re-attach it using proper tools and techniques. The task is scored using a NATEF checklist.

Met Standard of Success: Yes

For this outcome 78.33 percent of the students scored over 70%. This is compared to the written outcome language, "70% of the students will score an overall average of 70% or higher."

7. Based on your interpretation of the assessment results, describe the areas of strength in student achievement of this learning outcome.

78.33% of the students scored 70% or higher on this task list. Some (7 of 61) did not complete the task. This task in the course is one that most students may not want to participate in, but the skills associated with this outcome are important. The curriculum is well aligned to the tasks addressed in this outcome, but is near the threshold of not meeting the standard.

One section of this course seems to impact the data. In one section, 40% of the students did not complete the task. This is in contrast to no more than two (2 of 15) students who failed to complete the task in any other section. If the one section is removed from the data, the success rate is over 90%, as is the case with the other 5 outcomes.

Data for students in 5 of 14 sections was available. All students in those sections were assessed.

The sections of this course used for assessment were both morning and evening courses. No DL or MM courses were offered.

Met Standard of Success: Yes

For this outcome 85.00 percent of the students scored over 70%. This is compared to the written outcome language, "70% of the students will score an overall average of 70% or higher."

85% of the students scored 70% or higher on this activity. With the exception of one section, all but two students scored 100%. Students performed very well on this task.

In one section, all students scored 50%. This is most likely an instructor error but was included in the results anyway. The data for this section was valid for all other outcomes and therefore, supported its inclusion.

II. Course Summary and Action Plans Based on Assessment Results

1. Describe your overall impression of how this course is meeting the needs of students. Did the assessment process bring to light anything about student achievement of learning outcomes that surprised you?

I think that the high success rate for the outcomes for this course are a direct indication that this course is meeting the needs of the students. I was not surprised, but troubled that students that did not perform well on the outcomes early in the course are not successful in the course overall. This is an entry level course in the ASV certificate program, and as such, there are not many building blocks needed from previous class sections to complete early objectives. In general, my observation for most students is that if they make it to class and are able to participate, they usually perform well. I suggest that this means that the outcomes are reasonably well aligned with student success, and I would be concerned if students performed well on the outcomes and did poorly in the course overall.

I plan to leave this assessment report on the department's Google drive, so all ASV instructors can read it. I also plan to present the results of the assessment committee's review in a future department meeting.
